Letters to the Governor



Students practiced digital literacy skills as well as advocacy skills.




Mock Election

Voters even got a flag sticker with the words, "I voted!" on it. In the weeks leading up to the election, students studied the issues and the positions of each candidate on them.



Denise Reddington, one of the Adult Basic Education teachers at DALC, gave a presentation to adult educators from around the country at the annual National HiSET Conference in San Francisco in December, where she shared her secrets for math success.

HiSET replaced the GED as the test used to determine high school equivalency in New Hampshire, Maine and Massachusetts.

Reddington's presentation was called "Meeting the Needs of HiSET Math Educators and Test Takers."

Over the past two years, Denise and several other New Hampshire teachers have written a math guidebook based on the adult education college and career readiness standards (CCRS).

The guidebook contains more than 250 pages of definitions, teaching topics, and illustrations. At the conference, Reddington shared this book with teachers nationwide. She also talked about how New Hampshire has provided staff development to its HiSET teachers. HiSET math scores in New Hampshire have been some of the highest in the country.

Reddington has been with DALC for more than 20 years; she is a mentor teacher and a staff development consultant for the N.H. Bureau of Adult Education.

Staying with the math theme, our own **Kim Hanson** is now the State of New Hampshire "Train the Trainer" instructor for mathematics. Kim went to Tennessee last

April to participate in a national conference concerning College and Career Readiness Standards for Mathematics.

Hanson is very familiar with math standards that start in kindergarten and increase in complexity all the way through college. With Hanson behind the scenes, adult education teachers and students are becoming proficient in mathematics standards for life.

A Donor's Tale: DALC Board approves NHCF agency fund

A decade ago, just as the Dover Adult Learning Center prepared to move to the McConnell Center, the board of directors launched a campaign called *Come Help Us Grow*. Your support of this major gift campaign helped ensure long term sustainability and future growth of DALC.


The five-year campaign successfully reached its \$100,000 goal six months ahead of schedule. About half of the funds raised in the *Come Help Us Grow!* campaign were used to renovate our space and make the move to a secure home in the McConnell Community Center. The remainder of the campaign and additional funds accrued over the years, now totaling \$100,000, have become seed money for a new fund that will be a permanent investment that will generate revenue for adult education in Strafford County long into the future.

In December, the DALC Board of Directors approved the creation of an agency fund to be administered by the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation.

NHCF agency funds help ensure that nonprofits will be able to fulfill their mission now and well into the future. NHCF manages all aspects of the fund including investing the assets in a diversified portfolio and distributing grants to the organization on an annual basis.

The unrestricted revenue generated by the fund will allow us flexibility to try new things and to grow the organization. Any excess growth gets reinvested, and the annual distribution grows.

Another measure the board is considering is whether to dedicate bequests received through the Helen Phipps Heritage Society to the agency fund. Helen became the Director of Dover Adult Basic Education in the 1970's and went on to found Dover Adult Learning Center. The Heritage Society was founded in her memory and accepts bequests through wills, insurance policies, trusts, annuities, IRAs or retirement plans. <http://www.doveradultlearning.org/support/heritage-society>
