CPL Andrew Aimesbury Memorial Fund (AAMF) Scholarship

<u>Purpose:</u> This scholarship will honor the memory of Andrew Aimesbury, a graduate of DALC whose ideals stand as an inspiration to all who aspire to do positive work for themselves, their families, and their community. Successful applicants will have an understanding of the importance of working for a greater good and demonstrate how their desire to pursue post-secondary education reflects this understanding. Submissions will be accepted, reviewed and awarded throughout the year, at least quarterly with the intention of reviewing applications within 90 days of receipt. One large or several small awards may be made per year. Awards will be based on the criteria below.

The scholarship is available to current DALC students and DALC graduates who plan to pursue post-secondary education. For this program, "post-secondary education" means college, apprenticeship or certificate programs, or formal training toward an occupational goal, e.g., trade school. The award is primarily for tuition, which will be paid directly to a qualifying institution or program; however, applicants may request a portion of the award be used to offset valid educational expenses. Such "non-tuition" aid will be subject to approval by the Andrew Aimesbury Memorial Fund Committee.

Candidates must be recommended by a DALC staff person and applications must be approved by the Andrew Aimesbury Memorial Fund Scholarship Committee. Recipients will be named at DALC graduation in June and may be asked to attend. They may also be named in other DALC publications and communications. A member of Andrew's family will be notified of all awards and may confer the award, as appropriate and desired by them.

<u>Criteria</u>: Award of the scholarship will be based on:

- Status as a current student or past graduate of DALC
- DALC staff person (counselor, teacher or other) letter of recommendation
- The amount requested and how it will be used
- Demonstrated financial need
- A viable plan for continued education, as evidenced by acceptance/registration/current participation in a post-secondary educational experience.
- A letter of intent that addresses the importance of working for a greater good, as understood by the applicant
- The student's educational and career plan reflecting their understanding of "working for the greater good"

Andrew's story as told by his family

Our beautiful son and brother was killed during a military training accident December 09, 2015, serving his country and doing what he loved. Andrew accomplished so much in his 21 years. He was a great leader and everyone he met learned something from him. He loved kind people, protected those that were mistreated, and always encouraged his family and friends to be their best.

Many people do not know that Andrew struggled in school over the years. Andrew was very smart, but traditional school structure did not fit him. Andrew finished the 9th grade and then failed his 10th grade year. Andrew's guidance counselor at Dover High School once said, "Andrew, if I could give you a grade for personal character, I would give you an "A", but you have to do your homework." We will forever be grateful to Martin Castle, for encouraging Andrew to pursue his GED at age 16. While a GED/HiSET is not seen as the standard path to success for many, it is the path that allowed our son to excel.

The staff at Dover Adult Learning Center in Dover, NH greeted Andrew with open arms and assisted him in his pursuit of his GED.

Andrew received his GED certificate on his 17th birthday, one of the most proud days of his life at that point. He then enrolled at Great Bay Community College in Portsmouth, NH to pursue criminal justice. While there, he made the decision to join the Army and to ultimately become an Army Ranger.

DOVER — Andrew A. Aimesbury struggled to succeed in the Dover public school system, eventually finding his way, earning his GED diploma early and beginning a career in the military as a corporal in the Army Rangers.

A year after his death in a military training accident, his parents Karen Kelsey and Carl Aimesbury started the CPL Andrew A. Aimesbury Scholarship Fund in his honor, to give financial assistance to students at the Dover Adult Learning Center (DALC), who like Andrew, seek an alternative learning path.



Andrew was assigned to Company D, 1st Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment, at Hunter Army Airfield, in Georgia and worked as a Ranger team leader. He had served one tour in Afghanistan. Aimesbury will be remembered, according to Col. Brandon Tegtmeier, as an extraordinary man.

Andrew was born in Manchester and lived in Strafford. He attended Dover High School and enlisted in January 2013. His awards and decorations include the Ranger Tab, Expert Infantryman's Badge, the Parachutist Badge, and the Marksmanship Qualification Badge Expert-Carbine. He has also been awarded the Army Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal with Campaign Star, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, and the NATO Medal.
